A Co-Creation: Buddhist Contemplative Peace Guide

In the spirit of universality, this suggested three-step practice and listed resources are a selection of the many sacred texts that could be used in contemplative inquiry. The intent is developing the clarity of mind that reawakens the peaceful core. It is co-creation because we are each a co-creator of peace.

- 1. Choose a sacred text; selected Buddhist options are:
  - a. "Purifying Practices," Chapter Eleven of the Avatamsaka Sutra; consists of 114 vows in verses that promote the fundamental interconnections of sentient beings.
  - b. The Sixth Patriarch's Platform Sutra, Chapter Six, "Sitting Meditation"; principles and foundations of meditation.
  - c. The Shurangama Sutra, Chapter Six, "The Twenty-Five Sages Speaks of Enlightenment": the awakening pathways of Twenty-Five Buddhist sages.
- 2. While sitting, walking, or standing still, read, recite, copy, listen, dialog, contemplate, and/or write about the sacred text; word-by-word, section-by-section; and as a whole.
- 3. End with dedications: For ongoing illuminations in peace, of peace, and for peace.

May every living being,

Our minds as one and radiant with light,
