# Appendix B Lesson Plan Comparison

#### **Conventional Learning**

This fairy tale is commonly used in learning at the lower grades of the elementary school level. Students sit neatly in their chairs, and their job is to listen. The teacher starts the lesson by mentioning the purpose, then tells the story with flat expressions and intonation, with no dialogue. In the end, the teacher conveys the moral message.

## **Peace Pedagogy**

With a touch of peace pedagogy, the fairy tale "Ants and Pigeons," prevalent in Sundanese society, can be developed into a lesson that contains values of peace. By using a transformative paradigm, learning focuses more on exploring together the values contained in fairy tales. Students are no longer only tasked with "listening to stories,"

involving student work in groups, developing critical thinking skills and problemsolving, and connecting with real contexts of student life.

**Activity name** : We are one

**Aims** : Helping students develop empathy.

**Learning outcomes** : Students can identify reasons for helping/not helping

others.

Level : Elementary School (low grade)

Method : Fairytale Time : 30-40 minute

**Learning materials** : The Tale of the Ant and the Pigeon

Activity • Form two small gro

- Form two small groups of 3-5 students with diverse gender compositions (give students the freedom to choose);
- Name the group of Ants and Pigeons according to the theme of the fairy tale being studied;
- To make the interaction between students more substantial, try to sit in a circle, and the teacher sits between two groups of students;
- The teacher asks students to listen to a fairy tale that is conveyed with full appreciation;
- The rules agreed upon during the story are that students should listen wholeheartedly
- After the teacher has finished telling the story, ask students in their respective groups to discuss with each other to answer the following questions:
  - ✓ What are the core values contained in this story?
  - ✓ Is it easy for Ants or Pigeons to help?

- ✓ Identify the reasons for Ants or Pigeons to give or not to help?
- ✓ Can we blame when Pigeons or Ants do not want to help?
- ✓ Why should Ants or Pigeons assist?
- After students have filled out the worksheets, the teacher asks group representatives to present the results of group discussions and asks other groups to participate in giving responses
- In the end, the teacher reinforces the importance of helping one another to create a peaceful life.
   The teacher asks students to tell real experiences in helping others, including exploring the feelings and

thoughts that surround them when helping others.
